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## THE WAGE STRUCTURE OF HIGHLY QUALIFIED NON-WHITE MEN AS AT 1 MARCH 1977

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## SUMMARY

This investigation into the wage structure of highly qualified Non-White men as at 1 March 1977 is being undertaken as a follow-up to a similar investigation in 1975 as part of the HSRC's research on the wage structure of highly qualified manpower and related aspects.

A survey group of 1262 persons was selected from the 1373 persons who participated in this investigation, consisting of economically active men up to and including the age of 64 years and who reside in the RSA and SWA. The wage structure of this group is analysed according to population group, occupation, employer sector and age and, where appropriate, compared with corresponding data for 1975.

Surveys on the wage structure of highly qualified manpower were undertaken by the Human Sciences Research Council during 1971, 1973, 1975 and 1977. Since 1975, these surveys were extended in such a way that Non-Whites were also included. An investigation into the wage structure of highly qualified White men in 1977 has already been launched and the aim of this report will be to investigate the wage structure of highly qualified Non-White men as at 1 March 1977 and to compare the resulting figures with 1975 data.

THE SURVEY GROUP AND QUESTIONNAIRE

The HSRC maintains a National Register of Natural and Social Scientists which records, inter alia, the names, addresses, sex, age and qualifications of graduates and similarly qualified persons. All Non-White males who reside in the RSA and SWA and whose names appear in the National Register were involved in this investigation. A questionnaire was sent to each of these persons (see Appendix) . Of the 4712 questionnaires which were dis= patched, $1373(29,1 \%)$ were returned. The latter group is referred to as the respondent group.

Data on the respondents' occupation, employer and salary which are analysed in this report were obtained by means of the above-mentioned questionnaire. Particulars of the respondents' age, language of correspondence and quali= fications were obtained from the National Register. The anonymity of respondents was protected throughout and in no case was a completed ques= tionnaire linked with the name or address of a respondent.

For the purposes of this investigation, a survey group of 1262 persons ( $91,9 \%$ ), consisting of all economically active persons up to and including the age of 64 years, was selected from the 1373 questionnaires which were returned. Persons over 64 years of age and persons who are not economically active, such as pensioners, full-time students and the unemployed were consequently excluded from this investigation.

In Tables 3.1-3.3, 3.4-3.6 and 3.7-3.9, the National Register group and the respondent group are compared in respect of age distribution, language distribution and highest qualification level for Asians, Blacks and Coloureds respectively. It appears from these tables that the percentual deviations between the National Register group and the respondent group as regards the aspects which are compared are generally fairly small and insignificant. The respondent group may consequently be regarded as a representative sample of the National Register. As regards Coloureds and Asians, the respondent group may furthermore be regarded as to a considerable extent representative of the Non-White graduate population of the country, since the National Register, as it existed in 1970, was proved to be a representative sample of the graduate population of the country (Ebersohn, D. Graduate Manpower of South Africa, HSRC, 1972 ).

Certain concepts which are used in this report will be described briefly for the purpose of clarity.

### 4.3 Self-employeed persons

Self-employeed persons are those who work for themselves in their own businesses or practices, including partners of professional undertakings and managing directors who own more than 50 per cent of a company's shares.
4.4 Gross salary of employees

The gross salary of an employee is his annual salary which he receives as a result of the direct pursuit of his occupation, before any deductions are made. Overtime earnings, bonuses, allowances and income from other sources are not included in gross salary.

### 4.5 Net income of self-employed persons.

The net income of a self-employed person is the net income which such a person derives from the direct pursuit of his occupation prior to taxation. In= come obtained after hours from related salaried work is not included.

## 4.6 <br> Additional earnings

In the case of employees, additional earnings consist of income prior to taxation derived from cash bonuses, income earned by means of overtime, part-time instruction and consultation. As regards self-employed persons, additional earnings consist of income prior to taxation earned from related salaried work after hours. Additional earnings are analysed separately in this report.

### 4.7 Wage structure as at 1 March 1977

The term wage structure is used to refer jointly to the gross salary of employees and the net income of self-employed persons, as well as in the cases where additional income is indicated together with gross salary or net income. The wage structure analysed in this report pertains throughout to the situation as it was on 1 March 1977, except in those cases where, in comparative analysis, reference is made to 1975 wage structures.

### 4.8 Median and quartiles

The median wage (Me) signifies that 50 per cent of the persons in the group concerned receive more and 50 per cent less than the indicated wage. The first quartile $\left(Q_{1}\right)$ indicates that 25 per cent of the group of persons receive less and 75 per cent more than the $Q_{1}$ wage. The third quartile $\left(Q_{3}\right)$ indicates that 75 per cent of the group receive less and 25 per cent more than the $Q_{3}$ wage. This consequently means that 50 per cent of the group of persons receive more than the $Q_{1}$ wage but less than the $Q_{3}$ wage.

In this report, median and quartile wages are not indicated where there are fewer than five persons in a particular group in order to ensure the anonymity of such persons. All wages indicated are in rands per annum.

FINDINGS

Since the tables used in this analysis are largely self-explanatory, they will be discussed in broad outline only. The tables are grouped together after this discussion.

### 5.1 Wage structure according to occupation and employer sector <br> Wage structure according to occupation and employer sector is indicated in Tables 7.1, 7.2 and 7.3 for Asians, Blacks and Coloureds respectively. As has already been mentioned, the indicated wage refers to gross salary of employees and net income of self-employed persons only. Additional earnings are not included.

Particularly as regards Blacks and Coloureds, the majority of respondents are employed in the public sector ( 75,8 per cent and 78,3 per cent in the case of Blacks and Coloureds respectively, as against 62,4 per cent in res= pect of Asians). In the case of all three population groups, the median wage for the public sector as a whole is higher than that for the private sector In the public sector, as well as in the private sector, the highest sectoral median wage is earned by Coloureds, followed by Asians and then Blacks. However, in the case of the private sector, the difference in median wage between the three population groups concerned, is insignificant. As regards self-employed persons as a group, the highest median wage is received by Blacks, followed by Asians and Coloureds, in that order. Although the median wages of self-employed persons in all three population groups are considerably higher than the median wages of employees, it should be remembered that these two groups of figures are not comparable directly, since a self-em= ployed person's remuneration does not include salary only but also entre= preneurial wage and a risk premium.
5.2 Gross salary of employees and net income of self-employed persons accor= ding to occupation and age

As regards employees, only a few occupations, and in the case of self-em= ployed persons, only Asian medical practitioners provided a sufficient num= ber of persons who pursue the occupations to make possible an analysis of income according to age. These analyses are indicated in Tables 7.4 to 7.7.
5.3 Gross salary and additional earnings.

The gross salary and additional earnings of employees according to occupation
are indicated in Tables 7.8, 7.9 and 7.10 for Asians, Blacks and Coloureds respectively. With only a few exceptions, a comparatively large proportion of the persons in the occupations concerned indicated that they receive a cash bonus. Gross salary is augmented by overtime remuneration, part= time instruction and consultation in a few cases only, except in the case of Asian medical practitioners where gross salary is augmented considerably by overtime remuneration (69,2 per cent of the respondents indicated over= time remuneration amounting to a median of R3 690 per annum as against median annual salary of R8500).
5.6 Comparison of wage structure according to employer sector and population
group : 1975/1977
Regarding employees, Table 7.13 indicates that in the case of both Asians and Blacks the percentual increase in median wage for the period 1975/1977 was higher in the private sector than in the public sector. In the private sector, the increase in median wage was 55,0 per cent, 18,5 per cent and

10,3 per cent for Blacks, Asians and Coloureds respectively, whereas the increase in the public sector was 29,2 per cent, 13,6 per cent and 5,6 per cent for Blacks, Coloureds and Asians respectively. In the case of selfemployed persons, the increase in median income during the period concerned, was 41,2 per cent for Coloureds, 31,6 per cent for Blacks and 1,5 per cent for Asians. These data are also illustrated in Figure 7.1.

From Table 7.13 and Figure 7.2, it is striking that the median wage of Black employees, both in the public and the private sector, increased at a conside= rably higher rate during the period 1975/1977, than the median wage of Asians and Coloureds. In the case of self-employed persons, the median income of Blacks retains the highest level in 1977, having been second to Asians in 1975.

## CONCLUDING REMARKS

The wage surveys which were conducted in 1975 and 1977 will be repeated in 1979 as part of the HSRC's research programme on the wage structure of highly qualified persons and related aspects. As soon as the size of the respondent group has revealed an adequate increase, and income data on a larger number of persons in each occupation become available, more signi= ficant analyses will be done.
