Overview of the project and exhibition

The exhibition Aftermath: Violence and Wellbeing in the Context of the Student Movement is a collection of 34 photos taken and/or supplied by student leaders, which they reflect on as representations of their experiences of violence during the #FeesMustFall student movement, and their search for wellbeing after these experiences.


The images have been selected and curated from more than 100 images that were produced as part of a photovoice research project 2019/20. (Curator: Carl Collison). (NB. Some images are copyrighted).

The research team held photovoice workshops with 26 student leaders and activists on five campuses of universities which experienced high levels of violence during the 2015/16 #FeesMustFall student movement: University of the Western Cape (UWC), University of Venda (Univen), University of the Free State (UFS), University of Fort Hare (UFH) and Durban University of Technology (DUT)

Methodology

Data collection and analysis

- Rapid photovoice (published in *International Journal of Qualitative Methods*)
 https://journals.sagepub.com/doi/full/10.1177/16094069211004124
- Institution-specific 3-4 days of Photovoice workshops, face-to-face (4), zoom (1)
- 5 universities with 5-10 student participants each
- Criteria for participation: experienced violence as part of student protests on their campus - whether as observers, victims or perpetrators - during the 2015/16 student protests.
- Original research team: TM Luescher (PI), KG Morwe (Co-PI), A Wilson Fadiji (PM).
- Various qualitative methods of data analysis including thematic analysis
- Issues: research ethics, trustworthiness, emancipatory and advocacy goals

Dissemination

- 5 campus-specific exhibitions (during workshops) & World Café sessions
- Online national exhibition (SAHO) & travelling exhibition (curator: Carl Collison)
- Advocacy meetings so far: USAf (HELM), SU SAS & seminars
- Publications: student affairs manual; scholarly photo book; articles & chapters
